Invisible working Day

In 2001, AFEAS in Canada set up the invisible working day and since, throughout the world, the first Tuesday of April is taking place the symbolic day. And it is today: the 7th of April.

What represents the invisible work?

The invisible work, unpaid, consists of all of the work done within the family and the voluntary work done in the community, whatever the status of the person.

How to make visible the invisible work?

The recognition of the value of the invisible work allows to increase the standing of people who do it, generally, women as mothers and carers, without forgetting all forms of voluntary work in schools, hospitals, homes, sports clubs and various associations...

In 2009, to understand the lack of recognition and the support to women and men whose contribution to their family and the community is judged essential to their development and survival?

Invisible work, that counts!
